Greetings from Jerusalem Corners,

On February 17, 1952, Shirley Pfalzgraf was received into membership here at The First Church of Evans, along with her father, mother and her two brothers, the Vail family, along with her sister in law to be, Edel Solberg. Together, they were a family of people who would make much of the history of our church in the decades that followed. Shirley would sing in our choir for decades, serve in our office as church secretary, and late in life she would serve as the Derby Fair chair, breathing life and elegance and energy into the old fair and successfully passing the torch to a new generation of leaders who have brought the Derby Fair into its second century.

After raising three children who only ever made her beam with pride, she married Ron Pfalzgraf, who simply loved and supported her through the whirlwind of activities that she engaged in all over the community through her seventies and eighties and into her nineties. I only have space here to briefly and entirely understate the case. She loved the Lord through up and down and thick and thin. She loved her husband and her children, the grands and great grands and she loved our church.

And we love her and will worship in the same room with her again. Soon and very soon. Weeks ago, Carl Mende wrote the devotions we will worship by this morning, but it turns out that they are perfect for today.

Devotional

Matthew 25:14-21 Carl Mende, Elder and Properties Chair

 $``For the kingdom\ of\ heaven\ will\ be\ like\ a\ man\ going\ on\ a\ journey,$

who called his servants and entrusted to them his property.

To one he gave five talents, to another two, to another one, to each according to his ability. Then he went away.

He who had received the five talents went at once and traded with them, and he made five talents more.

So also he who had two talents made two talents more.

But he who had been given one talent went and dug in the ground and hid his master's money.

Now after a long time the master of those servants came and settled accounts with them.

And he who had received the five talents came forward, bringing five talents more, saying,

'Master, you delivered to me five talents; here I have made five talents more.'

His master said to him, 'Well done, good and faithful servant. You have been faithful over a little,

I will set you over much. Enter into the joy of your master."

Losing a loved one is never an easy thing. The sense of loss and grief can be overwhelming at times. We miss their smiles, their laughter, even their quiet presence in the room. When my father passed away, I was tasked with giving the eulogy for my father. It was a raw and emotional event and probably one of the most difficult things I have ever done. As I spoke, I referred to the parable of the talents in Matthew 25 and quoted from verse 21: "His master said to him, 'Well done, good and faithful servant. You were faithful with a few things.

I will put you in charge of many things; enter the joy of your master."

Charles Spurgeon said of this verse: "This [joy] is not the servant's portion, but the Master's portion shared with his faithful servants...not so much that we shall have a joy of our own as that we shall enter the joy of our Lord." We may grieve the loss of a loved one, but we can rejoice for those who are followers of Jesus, they have entered into joy.

In Revelation 21:3,4, we read of when God's Kingdom is fully established:

"And I heard a loud voice from the throne, saying, 'Behold, the tabernacle of God is among men,

and He will dwell among them, and they shall be His people, and God Himself will be among them,

And he will wipe away every tear from their eyes; and there will no longer be any death; there will no longer be any mourning, or crying, or pain; the first things have passed away.'"

There will be no pain and suffering, just the joy of being in the presence of God for all eternity. May God bring that day when there will be no more sorrow and we will be united with our loved ones forever.

Blessed is the man who remains steadfast under trial, for when he has stood the test he will receive the crown of life, which God has promised to those who love him.

I've always enjoyed the beauty and majesty of old hymns. We are blessed to be able to sing so many of them in our church. Recently, I found myself humming the hymn, "Stand Up, Stand Up for Jesus".

The fourth verse of the hymn goes:

"Stand up, stand up for Jesus! The strife will not be long; This day the noise of battle, the next the victor's song; To him that overcometh a crown of life shall be; He with the King of glory shall reign eternally."

This verse is echoed in the words of the Apostle Paul. The Apostle Paul as he approached the end of his life wrote to his young disciple Timothy in 2 Timothy 4:7,8:

"I have fought the good fight, I have finished the race, I have kept the faith.

Henceforth there is laid up for me a crown of righteousness,
which the Lord, the righteous judge, will award to me on that Day,
and not only to me but also to all who have loved his appearing.

No matter what life throws at us, if we persevere, if we hold fast to the truth, to faith in Christ "the Lord, the righteous judge", then there is a crown of righteousness laid up for us just as there was for Paul. We have a glorious future in store for us. We look forward to that day when we will stand before our Savior and receive that crown of life.

So next time you are feeling discouraged or overwhelmed, think of this hymn and remember:

"To him that overcometh a crown of life shall be; He with the King of glory shall reign eternally."
